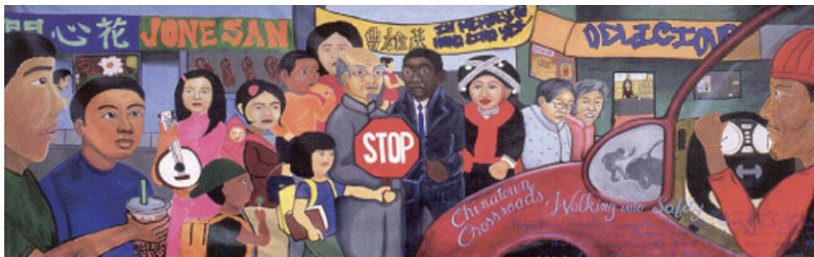

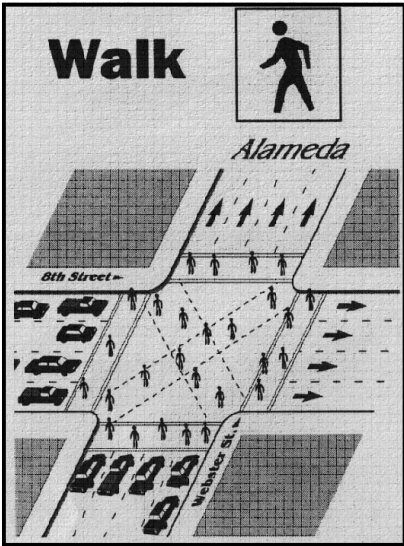


REVIVE CHINATOWN!



Helping to make Oakland
Chinatown a more pedestrian
friendly, safe, and culturally
vibrant and thriving retail and
service center

Revive Chinatown! is a community planning project that was started in 2002 and spearheaded by the City of Oakland, Asian Health Services, and the Oakland Chinatown Chamber of Commerce. Working with the Oakland Chinatown community, a series of pedestrian safety and streetscape recommendations to improve the safety and quality of life for Oakland Chinatown were made. These improvements are being implemented today! Here are some examples of the improvements:



1. THREE MORE SCRAMBLE SYSTEMS WITH DECORATED PAVINGS

These four-way crosswalks help improve pedestrian safety by separating pedestrians and cars from each other and reduce pedestrian and car conflicts. The decorated pavement markings for these scramble systems will increase the visibility of these intersections while capturing the cultural vibrancy of Oakland Chinatown.

2. PEDESTRIAN LIGHTING

Lighting on 8th and Webster Streets help to make pedestrians feel safer when walking in Chinatown.



3. PEDESTRIAN COUNTDOWN SIGNALS

These signals help pedestrians make informed decisions when crossing an intersection by providing information on how much time a pedestrian has to cross the street.



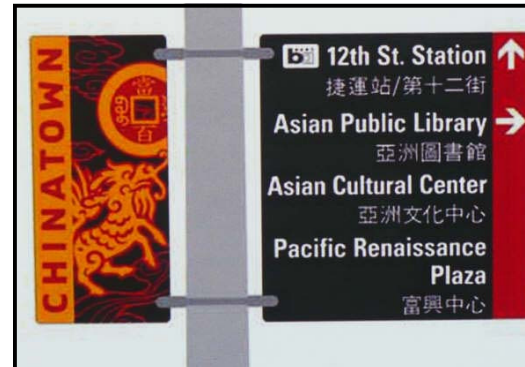
4. EXPANDED SIDEWALK CORNERS

Expanded sidewalk corners make it easier for pedestrians, particularly for seniors and children, to cross an intersection by decreasing the distance a pedestrian has to cross the street. These corners also enhance driver and pedestrian visibility.



5. BILINGUAL SIGNAGE AND BANNERS

Directional bilingual signage posted throughout Chinatown will help inform where key destinations are located. Community banners accompanying this signage have been designed to capture the vibrant culture of Oakland Chinatown.
