# Supervisors OK Central Bike Parking

The Board of Supervisors today can claim credit for establishing the City's first bicycle parking space in the huge, underground Civic Center Garage.

Creating the 20 bike parking spaces and fixing the rate at 25 cents a day was sort of a fun legislative engagement compared to the usually dreary business of the supervisors.

The Parking Authority had recommended the venture at a fee of 30 cents, including a nickel parking tax.

Board President Dianne Feinstein expressed "reservations on the amount when we're trying to encourage people to use bicycles."

Supervisor Robert Mendelsohn at once moved an amendment to reduce the fee to a quarter. Supervisor John Barbagelata said he would oppose that on "economic grounds, but later dropped this idea.

Supervisor Robert Gonzales said he would like to see bike parking free and Supervisor Roger Boas remarked, "This is not a revenue producer.

"I'd be for free bike parking just to get people out of their cars," said Boas, who sells news cars.

After about 15 minutes of toying with the subject, the board adopted Mendelsohn's 25 cent fee and asked the Parking Authority to report back in six months on the possibility of reducing it and expanding bike parking areas.

In other action yesterday, the supervisors:

- Amended the salary ordinance to allow a cash payment to City employes for accumulated sick leave time.

- Appropriated a nother \$5.7 million to meet City welfare costs through the end of this fiscal year, simultaneously ordering their budget analyst to commence an audit of welfare spending this morning.

- Sent to committee a proposal by Mendelsohn to establish a 21 member citizens committee to prepare a reorganization plan for the Board of Education.

- Sent to committee Supervisor Michael Driscoll's proposal to extend the Golden Gate parking traffic prohibition to include Saturdays during the summer.

The board was told the sick leave benefit, identical to what it granted police and firemen two years ago, would cost \$150,000 a year.

Supervisors Terry A. Francois and Peter Tamaras explained many employes presently precade their retirement by taking sick leave with full pay. Employes can accrue up to six months sick leave.

The latest welfare appropriation sparked a rash of familiar complaints about welfare spending. Besides ordering Budget Analyst Harvey Martin Rose into the books, at Boas's behest, the board heard Supervisor Ronald Pelosi call for hearings on The City's power to impose a local residence rule on general assistance recipients.

Confusion still reigned today in the disputed Richmond City Council election.

Richard Nelson, sworn in as councilman yesterday morning, was barred from taking his seat at last night's meeting by a court order issued by Contra Costa Superior Judge S. C. Masterson late yesterday.

### Invalld

Judge Masterson also ruled that the swearing in was invalld.

The rulings were contained in a temporary restraining order granted to George Livingston, the incumbent councilman. Judge Masterson set June 4 for a hearing on whether the restraining order against Nelson should be made permanent.

### Challenged

Livingston lost to Nelson by an eight vote margin in the May 11 election, but turned up a two vote winner in a recount last Saturday. The recount has been chal-
